their dream home by the sea, they found this one - a former rectory in Ovingdean, East Sussex, that has views of the sea. 'It had been empty for a while because the vicar had left and wasn't being replaced,' says Caireen, 'so we entered into negotiations with the church. It took a long time, but we got the house eventually.'

Despite having to wait so long to find their ideal home, Caireen sees the time she and Gene spent renting as a positive experience. "We've lived in about five different kinds of houses since we got married in 2005, and from that we worked out exactly what we needed from a home,' she says. The couple have two

children - Jacob, 10, and Lucas, six - and Gene's five older children – Sam, 23, Emily, 21, Bethany, 18, William, 15, and Oliver, 14 – are regular visitors, so space was a priority. While the location of the rectory was perfect, the couple had plans to extend to create a house that could cope with such a big family. People come into our house now and say, "We don't know how you had the vision to do this", but it all came out

of our need to make family life work, says Caireen. And work it has. The transformation from stuffy, Thirties rectory to a modern, light-filled house that wouldn't look out of place on the east or west coast of America is remarkable. Caireen and Gene consulted several architects to help them envisage the extension, but were not convinced. They all made some fairly radical suggestions for what we thought didn't need a drastic solution,' says Caireen.

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xactly what we wanted, so we found someone to do the drawings, who in turn brought in a structural

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ngineer to help us with the whole process.' Caireen and Gene's priority was to work with the existing building, not against it, but to increase its size by making the garage part of the living space downstairs and then extending at the back of the house to make way for a massive kitchen area that's open plan to the new downstairs living space and also open pian to the new downstarts iving space and asis a utility room. They also gained more space upstairs by building over the garage to get an en-suite bathroom and dressing room for the main bedroom. They then built over the old kitchen, which is now a family room, to get a fourth bedroom upstairs.

Work on the extensions began in August 2010 just a month before Caireen, Gene and the kids had to be out of their rented house. Things moved along quickly, but there were some mishaps. On day two, Gene ripped out a kitchen cupboard with a little too much vigour and broke a water pipe,' Caireen recalls.
'There was much gushing of water and the mains wouldn't turn off. We had to call the water company

out, but in the meantime we had to drill a hole in the wall to allow the water to drain out?"

Minor floods aside, the builders made good progress. Even so, the family had to move into temporary accommodation for another month as the house was uninhabitable. Most of their possessions went into a 20ft x 8ft metal container in the garden. 'We got 90% of a four-bedroom house into it,' says Caireen.'I never would have believed it.'

It took a day to move everything back out of the container and into the house when the family moved in at the end of October. The place was still a mess, but the extensions were done. I had to wipe dust off my keyboard every time I sat down to work,' says Caireen. Progress felt slower once we'd moved in, I suppose because you see every little ounce of activity as it happens, rather than seeing the culmination at the end of a day or a week.' The house was still without a kitchen at this point and the family had to make do with a makeshift arrangement in one corner.

A year after work first began, the house was

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gave the outside a makeover, bringing a touch of New England to the south coast of England with pale-blue cladding. The house was just a big white box before, says Caireen. The interior also has a classic east coast of America look, with white walls used as a backdrop for gorgeous, well-made wood furniture, either painted or left in its natural state. The real success, though, is the open-plan living area downstairs. The entire space is flooded with light, thanks to two sets of bifold doors that open onto a large decked area, which becomes a second home for the family in summer.

The project isn't completely finished. Looking ahead, Caireen and Gene have plans to build a garage with a work space above it, to house Caireen's office with a work space above it, to noise Caireen's office and studio.
